On May 1st I received a thank you email from a Mr. Botten. It is attached. Please take a moment to read it. Officer Mike Parker is an officer that I have noticed goes above and beyond to help people. He has a great deal of compassion for people, both victim's and suspect's, and it shows up in how he interacts with the public. He is a real credit to both Long Beach and Ilwaco.

Loyalty Day Weekend, May 2nd – 3rd, was busy. The weather was great and the crowds were large at both parades. We had some excitement during the Long Beach Parade with two loose horses who came very close to running into downtown but thankfully they went into the enclosure at Double R Rides. We were also kept busy with some disturbance type calls.

On the 5th I attended a meeting with the Pacific County Health Department to talk about issues involving the homeless. One of the goals of the group is to hopefully get some sort of shelter for area homeless. I will keep both councils up to date on this as I intend to stay involved with the process.

I attended a meeting with the Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife to discuss the bear problem. The meeting was on May 7th. Fish and Wildlife is very reluctant to kill bears or even trap them. The information that I obtained from them is this: we live in bear country, secure your trash. We may want more action from them but that is not going to happen.


On May 15th I received a letter from the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission verifying that the department met the mandatory requirement for each officer to receive 24 hours of training per year. In 2014 each officer received approx. 38 hours of training. A copy of the letter is attached.

The department participated in mandatory workplace harassment training put on by Washington Cities Insurance Authority on the 18th.

On May 19th I attended a meeting in South Bend to discuss how the revenue from the .1% sales tax money, for dealing with people suffering from chemical dependency and mental health issues, will be spent. I presented from the law enforcement side the issues we deal with and how I would like to see the funds used. So many times I am asked why something can't be done with the mentally ill. I came across an article and I have attached it to this report. Please take the time to read it because it explains exactly the issues that we face when dealing with the mentally ill and why, thanks to some very misguided individuals, our hands are now tied.

Memorial Day Weekend, May 22nd – May 25th, was busy for the department. The crowds were large and the department was kept busy. There were no serious incidents over the weekend and most of the many calls dealt with locals, which is usually the case.

I attended the Memorial Day services at the Ilwaco Cemetery and the Black Lake Memorial on May 25th. The department also provided traffic control for the ceremony at Black Lake.

Is There a Right to Be Mentally Ill?

The mentally ill still suffer from the court ruling on Alberta Lessard.

Alberta Lessard died last month. Yes, *the* Alberta Lessard, whose famous 1972 court case guaranteed, in the words of one lawyer, “that non-dangerous people have the right to be mentally ill.” In the years since the Wisconsin supreme court ruled in her favor, Ms. Lessard cost the local, state, and federal governments at least \$2 million in police, court, jail, social-services, and hospital costs, not counting her Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI). This \$2 million, in essence, allowed her to remain mentally ill. Although Ms. Lessard was diagnosed with chronic paranoid schizophrenia, it may be questioned who was really crazy here.

Ms. Lessard had been a successful first-grade teacher until she developed late-onset paranoid schizophrenia in her early 40s. After shouting that the Communists were taking over the country and jumping from her second-floor window to escape them, she was involuntarily hospitalized. Two young public defenders just out of law school took on her case and turned it into a class-action lawsuit, intent on making it as difficult as possible to involuntarily hospitalize a person. With the Wisconsin supreme court’s decision, they got their wish. In addition to establishing important procedural protections, the court set a commitment standard based not on need for medical care but on a prediction that the person would pose an immediate danger. The court stated that there must be “an *extreme* likelihood that if the person is not confined he will do *immediate* harm to himself or another . . . and dangerousness is based upon a finding of a *recent* overt act, attempt or threat to do *substantial* harm to oneself or another” (emphasis added). The dangerousness standard established by the *Lessard* decision was adopted in part or in whole by almost every other state. According to legal scholar Alan Stone, the effect of this ruling, if strictly followed, was to “put a virtual end to involuntary confinement of psychiatric patients.”

And what happened to Ms. Lessard in the intervening decades until she died last month at the age of 94? Much of the time she lived in apartments, but at other times she was homeless, sleeping on city buses or in dumpsters. She was arrested dozens of times for misdemeanors such as striking a court clerk and breaking the glass door of the district attorney's office. On one occasion she led police on a four-mile chase through Milwaukee as she ran six red lights. On another she made "repeated threats to shoot school board members with a gun." Because of her psychotic behavior she was briefly hospitalized more than 20 times, but, because of the new focus on immediate danger in commitment standards, she could never be held long enough to be properly treated. When I interviewed her in 2006, she complained bitterly of what she perceived to be ongoing electronic surveillance, and constant harassment by public officials who were angry at her for exposing public corruption. When I asked her directly whether she had ever had schizophrenia, she responded: "Absolutely not. I have never had any of the symptoms."

One wonders what would have happened if Ms. Lessard had received proper treatment for her schizophrenia.

One wonders what would have happened if Ms. Lessard had received proper treatment for her schizophrenia. With luck she would have recovered enough to resume working. At a minimum she would have experienced less "harassment" and led a less chaotic life.

More than half of the states in the country still employ a treatment standard that protects people's right to suffer with psychosis as long as they are not dangerous. We have abandoned 700 years of Anglo-American civil law, which said that government has a responsibility to protect people who, because of mental illness, are unable to protect themselves. Consequently, there are more than a million Americans like Alberta Lessard who suffer from serious mental illness but are receiving no treatment for it. One would hope that the lessons Wisconsin learned from the Lessard case would set off a new wave of updates to state laws. Because until these laws are changed, we will continue to see far too many people lost to their illness, but not dangerous enough to qualify for care.

To the Mayor and City Council Members of Long Beach, Washington:

I want to introduce you to our organization. We are a nonprofit, science-based, non-advocacy outreach and education organization that focuses on improving wildlife- human interactions. We focus primarily on bears, wolves and cougars, but primarily bears, the species involved in the highest number of negative interactions with humans. We work very closely with the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, who brought to our attention the ongoing issues with bears in your region. We recently had an educational booth at the Ilwaco Farmer's Market, and handed out our flyers and brochures on bears and bear safety, as well as listened to people's accounts of their own bear experiences. It is very clear that a lot of work still remains to be done in order to reduce the number of incidences between humans and bears that are mostly caused by bears being attracted to human-provided food.

We have a program in King County "Bear Smart King County" that involves the local community. We think it may be a model for Long Beach, and would like to offer our services to develop such a program. I am attaching a "Wildlife Wise" brochure which we use in different locations. This one was sponsored by North Cascades National Park and the North Cascades Institute where numerous black bear encounters occurred due to bears being attracted by garbage and other food sources. It is our experience that if you can eliminate the food attractants, you can eliminate problems between humans and bears and other wildlife.



Are You Wildlife Wise?

Learn To Be Wildlife Wisel

Wildlife Wise Communities

Wildlife Wise is a community-based education project designed to prevent and reduce conflict between people and wildlife. This is done primarily by working with communities to identify and manage wildlife attractants found near homes, ranches, or businesses, and by providing tips for coexistence with wildlife when recreating or camping. Being wise about wildlife and teaching others how to be wildlife wise is one of the best ways we can ensure peaceful coexistence.

Wildlife and People

Curious by nature, bears are ruled by their stomachs. With their unparalleled sense of smell, bears are the most common species drawn to neighborhoods or residences by human attractants. If bears discover a food source their excellent memories will keep them coming back for more. This learned behavior more often than not threatens the safety of the bear and alarms residents of the community.

By minimizing bear attractants you can also expect to safely coexist with other species of wildlife that seek out human-provided food sources. Attracting raccoons, for example, can in turn attract cougars and coyotes to your property and put domestic animals in danger. So even if you don't live in bear country, it's wise to follow these simple precautions:

Wildlife Wise encourages people to change their behavior. If people do not make attractants available, such as garbage and fruit, the number of wildlife conflicts can be minimized. Preventing conflicts makes our communities safer and more sustainable. The program strives to prevent wildlife from becoming a nuisance through proper waste and attractant management.

Tips for Coexistence at Home

Easily obtainable, high-calories meals like food items in garbage cans, bird feeders, pet food, and compost often attract wildlife and bring them in close proximity to humans. Animals that are fed intentionally or unintentionally by people often lose their fear of humans and may become aggressive.

To prevent this:

- Store garbage indoors or in bear-resistant garbage cans.
- Do not leave food, scraps, garbage, recycling, or pet food accessible.
- Haul garbage to a dump site at least twice a week to avoid build-up of odors.
- If you have a pickup service, put garbage out the morning of pick up – not the night before, but if you're leaving home several days before pickup, haul your garbage to a dump.
- Store particularly odorous food scraps, such as fish and meat bones/scraps, in the freezer until garbage day.
- Keep barbecue grills clean and free from grease and store inside if possible.
- Keep pets inside at night if possible.
- Do not leave pet food, livestock food, or poultry feed outside without electric fencing.
- Enclose composts, fruit trees, beehives, and vegetable and flower gardens with electric fencing as they are powerful attractants.
- Do not put fish, meat, or fruit into your compost. Use lime to reduce odors.
- See that bird feeders, bird seed, suet, and hummingbird mixes are inaccessible to wildlife.
- Pick fruit from your trees regularly. Rotting fruit left on the ground is a powerful attractant.
- Encourage your neighbors and friends also to be **Wildlife Wisel**

Tips for Your Campsite

When camping off-trail, or in multi-site campgrounds close to the road:

- Check your site for signs of wildlife before setting up, then establish a clean, odor-free camp.
- Avoid camping near natural food sources such as berries. Never camp near an animal carcass, garbage, or wildlife signs such as tracks or scat.
- Avoid camping next to trails or streams, as wildlife use these as travel routes.
- Locate your cook area and food cache at least 100 yards downwind from your tent in unestablished camps.
- Never leave food, food carriers, or garbage unattended unless properly stored, including all edibles (even in sealed packaging), drinks, coolers (even when empty), pet food, fishing bait, and garbage.
- DO NOT bring food, drinks, or odorous non-food items into your tent including toothpaste, perfume, deodorant, chocolate, candy, and wrappers.
- Avoid canned foods with strong odors such as tuna as well as cooking greasy, odorous foods.
- Food items should be placed in bear-resistant food storage containers (where available) or stored in your vehicle's trunk or your truck cab.
- When bear-resistant containers are not available, hang food, garbage, pots, utensils, cosmetics, toiletries, and other odorous items. Place it inside several sealed plastic bags and stuff-sacks. Hang the bags at least 15 from ground between two trees that are 20 feet apart.
- NEVER cook or eat in your tent – the tent will smell of food and may attract bears.
- Remove the clothing you wore while cooking before going to sleep. Store these clothes in your vehicle or with your food and garbage.
- Wash all dishes immediately after eating. Dump water at least 100 yards from your campsite.
- Do not bury your garbage. Garbage should be deposited in bear-resistant garbage cans or stored in your vehicle until it can be dumped.
- Remember: "Pack It In, Pack It Out." This applies to ALL garbage (including biodegradable items such as fruit peels).
