AB 19-25- Resolution 2019-03 Establishing a Fee for Use of the Charging Station

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. This was discussed at a City Council workshop were the \$.25 per kilowatt hour charge would cover the costs of the city's contract with ChargePoint. This Resolution sets that fee.

AB 19-27- Ordinance 967 Amending the Sand Hauling Fees

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. The fees have not been updated since 1997. City staff recognized that it was time to amend these fees and incorporate inflation.

C. Murry made the motion to approve and authorize the Mayor to sign. C. McGuire seconded the motion; 3 Ayes; 2 Absent, motion passed.

AB 19-28- ChargePoint Contract

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. This was discussed at a City Council workshop where the Council analyzed the presented options. It is the most cost-effective to go with the 3-year term.

C. Murry made the motion to authorize the Mayor to execute the contract with ChargePoint for the City Electric Charging Station. C. Kemmer seconded the motion; 3 Ayes; 2 Absent, motion passed.

AB 19-29- Bolstad Restroom Contract

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. This item has been discussed numerous times and the City Council decided to move forward with a prefabricated restroom as it was most cost-effective. CXT incorporated has a contract with the State of Washington Department of Enterprise Services which makes it so that we can choose them as a vendor and fulfill the procurement requirements.

C. Murry made the motion to authorize the Mayor to enter into a contract with CXT to construct and deliver the new Bolstad Restrooms. C. McGuire seconded the motion; 3 Ayes; 2 Absent, motion passed.

AB 19-30— Gray and Osborne Contract for Engineering Services Construction Biosolids Plant David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. The agreement outlines the construction phase of this project, providing full construction management and inspection services.

C. McGuire made the motion to authorize Mayor Phillips to enter into an agreement with Gray & Osborne for Construction Management and Inspection Services for the Regional Biosolids Treatment Plant. C. McGuire seconded the motion; 3 Ayes; 2 Absent, motion passed.

SUMMARY STATEMENT: Facts regarding the SUP request:

- 1. A request to house a mixed martial arts studio in a portion of the building located at 1401 Pacific Ave N;
- 2. This studio would also hold events roughly 4 times a year, these events would include MMA matches. The matches would go from 6-10pm and would be ticketed events;
- 3. The gym would have 24-hour access for all members;
- 4. The gym would host classes for all ages;
- 5. Parking requirements would be 1 per every 400 feet of gross floor area, the portion of the building that would be dedicated to this use is 2800 SF. Therefore, they would need 7 spaces, which they have. Attached:
- 6. relevant portions of the city code; and
- 7. a draft letter permit including conditions for Council consideration.

This type of business is currently allowed in the same zone. As this applicant wishes to hold some events this use varied enough from the other establishments that Council review is required.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve/Deny/Condition SUP 2019-03 allowing a mixed martial arts studio, event space at 1401 Pacific Ave N.

12-11-14: SPECIAL USE PERMIT: For events, uses, and other activities not specifically addressed by this title, an applicant may apply to the city council for a special use permit. The issuance of a special use permit is at the discretion of the city council. The city council may impose such conditions as are deemed necessary to mitigate impacts including, but not limited to, noise, lighting, traffic and hours of operation. A special use permit shall not be used to permanently permit a use that would otherwise be prohibited by the zone district in which the property is situated. A special use permit shall have an expiration date that is no more than one (1) year after the approval date. Upon application, the city council may grant a single extension of a special use permit.

SUMMARY STATEMENT: During the Council, meeting on May 6, staff introduced the staff report reviewing the petitioners request to vacate the northern portion of the 4th ST NE ROW. Mr. Belisle owns the property directly to the north of the ROW. The Council has discussed this topic during workshops and Council meetings. The proposed Ordinance vacates the 12.5' x 50' northern portion of 4th ST NE that abuts the Belisle property. The Council can decide to charge up to 50% of market value. Leslie Brophy at Pacific Realty assessed this property at roughly \$1,631.25. Therefore, 50% would be \$815.63. Please see attached Ordinance and map.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve/Deny Ordinance No. 968 vacating the northern portion of 4th ST NE that abuts Mr. Belisle's property, granting the property to John Belisle for \$815.63.

ORDINANCE No. 968

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH, PACIFIC COUNTY, WASHINGTON, PROVIDING FOR THE VACATION OF A PORTION OF 4th STREET NORTHEAST RIGHT-OF-WAY, AND REPEALING ANY ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT.

WHEREAS, RCW 35.79 allows for the vacation of city streets; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Long Beach has been requested to vacate a section of right-of-way; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Long Beach Unified Development Ordinance provides for a process by which owners of any real property abutting upon any street or alley may petition the City Council to make vacation of the right-of-way; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council adopts the following Findings of Fact:

- 1. **Petition.** The City Council finds the petition comprises the following:
 - 1.1 A letter from petitioner Belisle received March 25, 2019.
 - 1.2 All other information contained in Case Files No. VAC 2019-01.
- 2. **Procedures.** The Council finds the following procedures were followed:
 - 2.1 On March 25, 2019 petition (Belisle) was received by the City.
 - 2.2 Soon after receipt of petitions, the Community Development Director consulted with City Department heads, Public Utility District No. 2 of Pacific County, and CenturyTel regarding this ROW. There were no conflicts reported.
 - 2.3 On April 15, 2019 the City Council approved Resolution 2019-02 setting the time and place for a public hearing on the matter.
 - On or soon after April 16, 2019 the City posted notice of the hearing at the subject site, the Long Beach post office, the Long Beach police station, and Long Beach City Hall. The notice included a statement of the proposal and a description of the land proposed to be vacated. The notice also included instruction on how to submit comments on the proposal.
 - 2.5 On May 6, 2019 the Long Beach City Council opened and conducted a public hearing at or soon after 7 pm to take public comment on this matter. There were no comments made.
- 3. **Proposal.** The City Council finds the following regarding the proposed project:
 - 3.1 The petitioners request and City staff recommend that Council vacate approximately 12.5' by 50 feet of the north side of the ROW of 4th Street NE (approximately 625 square feet), with transfer of title to the petitioners and all

- rights thereto.
- 3.2 The petitioners shall pay for all costs associated with this proposal, including and not limited to noticing fees and appraisal costs.
- 3.3 The petitioner shall pay the City a maximum of 50% of the appraised value of the subject property.
- 4. **Property characteristics.** The City Council finds the following regarding the subject property:
 - 4.1 Northern twelve and a half feet (12.5') of the right-of-way of 4th Street Northeast, from the western property line of parcel no. 730110595005 to the easterly property corner approximately 50 feet; of Lot 5, in Block 59 of East Addition to Long Beach, according to the Plat thereof on file in the office of the Auditor in Volume D-1 of Plats, Page 45, of Pacific County, Washington
 - 4.2 Characteristics of the property to which the vacated land would become part are as follows:
 - 4.2.1 One parcel that it 50' X 100'.
 - 4.2.2 The lot is developed is vacant with a proposed single-family residence.
 - 4.2.3 The parcel is located within the C flood zone.
 - 4.2.4 The parcel is essentially flat.
 - 4.2.5 The parcel has city utilities.
- 5. **Subject property land use and zoning.** The City Council finds the following regarding the land use and zoning of the property proposed for vacation:
 - 5.1 The subject property is located adjacent to the R1 Single-Family Residential zone pursuant to the City's zoning regulations.
 - 5.2 The subject property is located adjacent to property designated R1—Single-Family on the future land use map of the Long Beach Comprehensive Plan.
 - 5.3 The current land use of the subject property is vacant with a proposed single-family home.
- 6. **Surrounding property land use and zoning.** The City Council finds the following regarding the land use and zoning of surrounding property:

- 7. **Services.** The City Council finds the following regarding services and utilities available to serve the proposed project:

 - 7.2 Sewer is available from the City of Long Beach.
 - 7.3 Transportation: Existing from 4th St NE
 - 7.4 Public Education is provided by the Ocean Beach School District.
 - 7.5 Electricity is available from Pacific County PUD No. 2.
 - 7.6 Solid Waste is available from Peninsula Sanitation, and service is already provided on Ocean Beach Blvd N.
 - 7.7 Police and Fire are provided by the City of Long Beach Police and City of Long Beach Fire Departments.
 - 7.8 Medical and Emergency Facilities are provided by the City of Long Beach EMS, Medix Ambulance Service, and Ocean Beach Hospital District No. 3.
- 8. **City Staff and PUD Input.** The City Council finds the following regarding staff and PUD input:
 - 8.1 City staff did not identify any conflicts regarding City services or utilities that cannot be rectified.
 - 8.2 The PUD did not identify any conflicts regarding PUD services or utilities that cannot be rectified.
 - 8.3 Contact with CenturyTel was made, and staff did not hear back. A locate indicated that this vacation would not impact their services.
- 9. **City's Comprehensive Plan.** The City Council finds the proposed project complies with the following relevant portion of the City's Comprehensive Plan:

- 10. **City's Unified Development Regulations.** The City Council finds the proposal complies with the following relevant portions of the City's Unified Development regulations:

 - 10.3 11-6C-3: Notice of hearing.
 - 10.4 11-6C-4: Hearing; ordinance of vacation.

WHEREAS, the City Council has adopted Resolution 2019-02 setting the time and place for the public hearing to determine the vacation request; and,

WHEREAS, the City has provided the required notification and publication of the public hearing; and,

WHEREAS, the subject portion of 4th Street Northeast has been part of a dedicated City right-of-way for a period of twenty-five years or more; and,

WHEREAS, the abutting property owner will pay the City of Long Beach up to ½ the fair market value as provided for in RCW 35.79.030 and the City's Unified Development Code at 11-6C-4(A): Payment of Fair Market Value;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Right-of-Way Vacated

The following described right-of-way, northern twelve and a half feet (12.5') of the right-of-way of 4th Street Northeast, from the western property line of parcel no. 730110595005 to the easterly property corner approximately 50 feet; of Lot 5, in Block 59 of East Addition to Long Beach, according to the Plat thereof on file in the office of the Auditor in Volume D-1 of Plats, Page 45, of Pacific County, Washington is hereby vacated and ownership shall be transferred to the abutting property owner, John Belisle. The area to be vacated comprises approximately 625 square feet. The legal description for the vacated right-of-way is:

THAT PORTION OF FOURTH STREET OF EAST ADDITION TO LONG BEACH, ACCORDING TO THE PLAT THEREOF ON FILE IN THE OFFICE OF THE AUDITOR IN VOLUME D-1 OF PLATS, PAGE 45, OF PACIFIC COUNTY, WASHINGTON, DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS:

BEGINNING AT THE SOUTHWEST CORNER OF LOT 5 IN BLOCK 59 OF SAID EAST ADDITION:

THENCE EAST 50.00 FEET ALONG THE SOUTH LINE OF LOT 5 TO THE SOUTHEAST CORNER OF SAID LOT 5;

THENCE SOUTH AND PERPENDICULAR TO SAID SOUTH LINE 12.50 FEET;

THENCE WEST AND PARALLEL TO SAID SOUTH LINE 50.00 FEET;

THENCE NORTH AND PERPENDICULAR TO SAID SOUTH LINE 12.50 FEET TO THE POINT OF BEGINNING

SUBJECT TO AND TOGETHER WITH EASEMENTS, RESTRICTIONS, RESERVATIONS AND ENCUMRANCES OF RECORDS.

CONTAINING 625 SQUARE FEET, OR 0.014 ACRES, MORE OR LESS.

Section 2. Severability Clause.

If any provision of this Ordinance or its application to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance, or the application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.

Section 3. Repeal of conflicting ordinances

All existing Ordinances are hereby repealed insofar as they may be in conflict with this ordinance.

Section 4. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days from and after its passage, approval, and publication in the manner required by law only when the following conditions have been met:

- 1. The petitioner shall pay for all costs associated with this partial right-of-way vacation.
- 2. The petitioner shall cause to have a market-value appraisal made of the subject property at petitioner's expense or agree to a recent valuation of the property via a real estate professional.
- 3. The petitioner shall pay the City of Long Beach up to 50% of the market value of the subject property.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into by and between the CITY OF LONG BEACH (hereinafter called the Owner) and TAPANI, INC. (hereinafter called the Contractor).

The Owner and the Contractor agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1. WORK.

Construction of the Regional Biosolids Treatment Facility including a new pre-engineered metal wood chip storage building, new auger-cast pile supported solids handling building, new in-vessel concrete composing structure, new pre-engineered metal curing and handling building, new pre-engineered metal finished compost storage building, installation of a dewatering screw press and conveyor (procured by Owner), installation of the in-vessel composting equipment (procured by Owner), electrical, yard piping, paving and ancillary site work.

ARTICLE 2. CONTRACT TIME.

The Contractor shall substantially complete the Work required by the Contract within 180 working days (the Substantial Completion Date) and physically complete the Work within 210 working days (the Physical Completion Date).

ARTICLE 3. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES.

The Owner and the Contractor recognize that time is of the essence and that the Owner will suffer financial loss if the Work is not completed within the time, plus any extensions thereof, allowed in accordance with the Contract. They also recognize the inconvenience, expense, and difficulties involved in a legal proceeding to prove the actual loss suffered by the Owner if the Work is not completed within the time allowed in the Contract. Accordingly, the Owner and the Contractor agree that as liquidated damages for delay, and not as a penalty, the Contractor shall pay the Owner \$1,000.00 per day for each working day beyond the Substantial Completion Date that the Contractor achieves substantial completion of the Work and \$500.00 for each working day beyond the Physical Completion Date that the Contractor achieves physical completion of the Work.

ARTICLE 4. CONTRACT PRICE.

The Owner shall pay the Contractor the amount(s) set forth in the Proposal (in United States dollars) for completion of the Work in accordance with the Contract.

ARTICLE 5. CONTRACT.

The Contract, which comprises the entire agreement between the Owner and the Contractor concerning the Work, consists of the following:

- This Agreement;
- The Contractor's Proposal including the bid, bid schedule(s), information required of bidder, Proposal bond, and all required certificates and affidavits;
- The Performance Bond and the Public Works Payment Bond;
- The Contract Provisions, including 2018 WSDOT Standard Specification as referenced;
- The Plans (or drawings) consisting of 96 sheets, as listed in the index on sheet G-1 of the Plans;
- Addenda numbers 1 THROUGH 5, inclusive; and
- Change Orders issued after the effective date of this Agreement.

There are no Contract Documents other than those listed in this Article 5. The Contract may be amended only in writing by Change Order as provided in the Contract.

ARTICLE 6. MISCELLANEOUS.

For purpose of defending any work place injury claims by employees of the Contractor and Subcontractors, the Contractor waives any immunity granted under the State Industrial Insurance Law, RCW Title 51. This waiver has been specifically negotiated between the parties and is hereby acknowledged by the Contractor.

The Contractor shall not assign any rights under or interests in the Contract, including but not limited to rights to payment, without the prior written consent of the Owner. Unless specifically stated in a written consent to an assignment, no assignment will release or discharge the Contractor-assignor from any duty or responsibility under the Contract.

The Contract is binding upon the Owner and the Contractor, and their respective partners, successors, assigns and legal representatives.

Officer Jeff Cutting attended training on April 16th-18th. The course title was "Criminal Interdiction". Some of the topics covered included combating the opioid epidemic, spotting deceptive behavior, recognizing indicators of criminal activity and dealing with different ways criminals conceal drugs.

On the 22nd I attended a "behavioral health crises collaboration" meeting at Ocean Beach Hospital. Many different organizations were represented. Some of the topics covered included inpatient bed search coverage for persons detained and improving communication between all parties.
