C. Linhart made the motion to approve the Consent Agenda. C. Hanson seconded the motion. 5 Ayes, motion passed.

BUSINESS

AB 17-62- Fireworks Contract for New Year's Eve 2017

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. Staff believes the city has had excellent service and a great show in the past and feels the city should move forward with this purchase. Western Display Fireworks can offer a discount and provide more fireworks for the same amount of money if we agree to provide the show prior to them ordering the supplies to make them.

C. Linhart made the motion to approve and authorize the Mayor to sign the 2017 contract. C. Murry seconded the motion, 5 Ayes, motion passed.

AB 17-63- 2018 Preliminary Budget – PUBLIC HEARING -

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. The city is required to have a public hearing regarding the preliminary budget which is open for comment. Therefore, Mayor Phillips opened the public hearing at 7:09 p.m. and closed the hearing at 7:10 p.m. with no comments made.

AB 17-64- 2018 Property Tax Rate – **PUBLIC HEARING** -

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. The preliminary budget has been prepared with a 1.0% increase in property taxes, plus any new construction, banked amount and annexations. The amount of increase for 2018 is \$11,930.00.

Mayor Phillips opened the public hearing at 7:13 p.m. and closed the hearing at 7:14 p.m. with no comments made.

C. McGuire made the motion to approve resolution 2017-07 setting property tax rates. C. Hanson seconded the motion, 4 Ayes, 1 Nay, motion passed.

AB 17-65- DR 2017-25 Adrift Spa

Ariel Smith, Community Development Director, presented the Agenda Bill. Brady & Tiffany Turner have applied for the construction of 6 additional hotel rooms and spa, including an indoor pool on their property on 11th St. Southwest (Inn at Discovery Coast property). The property is in SR3 zoning which is intended for itinerant lodging and complimentary accessory uses. This decision must come from Council per 12-10-5(B)(3)(b) as the proposed building is over 6,000SF.

C. Linhart made the motion to approve the application with conditions, including the additional condition of a 5:12 pitch roof. C. Hanson seconded the motion, 5 Ayes, motion passed.

AB 17-66- DR 2017-26 JPCHA Driftwood Point Apartments

Ariel Smith, Community Development Director, presented the Agenda Bill. Erik Fagerland on behalf of the Joint Pacific County Housing Authority has applied to build a 27-unit apartment complex in the RC zone. The application proposes three single-bedroom units, 18 two-bedroom units, and six three-bedroom units along with a community building, laundry room and office. The apartments would be housed in two large complexes with the community area in a separate building. There is also additional room for greenspace and a playground.

C. Linhart made the motion to approve the application. C. Hanson seconded the motion, 5 Ayes, motion passed.

AB 17-67- Sludge Disposal Site Contract

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. The Washington State Department of Ecology has issued the city of Long Beach a Notice of Correction mandating that the city find an Alternative biosolids application site. The Goulter site has been vetted by the City Engineer and DOE staff, the next step is to amend the city's application permit and add the site mentioned in this contract. In order to move forward, the Council will need to approve this agreement and authorize the Mayor to execute it. C. Linhart made the motion to authorize the Mayor to enter into this agreement with Allen James Goulter III and Trina Goulter for the use of their property for sludge disposal. C. Murray seconded the motion, 5 Ayes, motion passed.

SUMMARY STATEMENT: It has been recommended to the City by the Washington State Department of Ecology that the Sewer Comprehensive Plan be amended to incorporate the Biosolids Engineering Report as part of Chapter 9, Biosolids Management Alternatives. This resolution authorizes that action and addresses the comment made by DOE.

RESOLUTION NO. 2017-08

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH, WASHINGTON, AMENDING THE 1999 SEWER COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

WHEREAS, the City's last sewer comprehensive plan originated in 1999 and provides information regarding all components of the sewer department; and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to amend such plan, specifically Chapter 9 entitled "Biosolids Management Alternatives," and formally adopt the Biosolids Engineering Report as a portion of this chapter; and

WHEREAS, a SEPA checklist was submitted to the City on September 26, 2017 and a Mitigated Determination of Non-Significance was issued on September 29, 2017 for the Biosolids Engineering Report; and

WHEREAS, at that time the report was submitted to the Washington State Department of Ecology for review; and

WHEREAS, the Washington State Department of Ecology has since made comments and the City has addressed each comment diligently.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH, WASHINGTON, DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

The City Council of the City of Long Beach, Washington, approves and adopts the 1999 Sewer Comprehensive Plan, amending Chapter 9, Biosolids Management Alternatives and incorporating the Biosolids Engineering Report as seen in Exhibit "A".

Effective Date. This resolution, being an exercise of power specifically delegated to the City legislative body, is not subject to referendum and shall take effect five (5) days after passage by the City Council.

2018 CONTRACT FOR TECHNICAL SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is entered into this	day of	, 2018, the City of Long
Beach, hereinafter referred to as the "City",	, and the Pacific	County Economic Development
Council, hereinafter referred to as the "ED0	C".	

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the EDC is actively pursuing and facilitating the location and expansion of business and industry in Pacific County through the development of a marketing strategy aimed at attracting new business and industry, the implementation of business assistance programs, the promotion of tourism and retirement living, and the establishment of liaison with local, county and state governments as well as the private business sector to coordinate and promote economic growth and development while preserving the quality of life in Pacific County; and

WHEREAS, the City is undertaking certain activities necessary to promote economic growth and development; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to engage the EDC to render certain technical advice and assistance in connection with such undertakings by the City;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties do mutually agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Scope of Service.</u> The EDC will: (a) receive from the City inquiries from businesses and industries indicating an interest in locating in the vicinity of the City and responding to such inquiries with information and materials including, but not limited to, wage rates, employment figures, personal income statistics, site availability and such other data as may be requested; (b) furnish current research data to assist the City in the area of economic growth and development. Such data shall include, but shall not be limited to, surveys of industrial growth within Pacific County, employment, population and general statistical information and other information of similar nature; (c) provide, free of additional charge, published materials prepared by the EDC to such persons as the City may direct plus other reports and studies as the EDC may prepare. Such materials may include, but are not limited to, wage rates, employment figures, personal income statistics and other special reports; and (d) serve as a general research reference service and assist in preparing replies to inquiries about facilities and resources required by new industries which may consider the City's services area for location or expansion.
- 2. <u>Time of Performance.</u> The services of the EDC are to commence on the first day of January, 2018, and terminate on the thirty-first of December, 2018. The duration of the contract may be extended upon mutual agreement between the parties hereto and pursuant to the terms and conditions of the contract, or terminated by 30 days notice to the other party.
- 3. <u>Compensation and Method of Payment.</u> The City shall reimburse the EDC for the services as follows:
- (a) The total contract price for the period specified in paragraph 2 shall be \$2,000.00.

- (b) Payment shall be due thirty days after receipt of Service Contract, signed by both parties.
- (c) The EDC shall submit such properly executed vouchers, invoices, or expenditure reports to the City as are requested.
- 4. <u>Changes.</u> Either party may request changes in scope of services, performing or reporting standards or compensation amount or method. Proposed changes which are mutually agreed upon shall be incorporated by written amendments to this Agreement.
- 5. <u>Notices.</u> Written notices to each party shall be sent to the following addresses: Pacific County Economic Development Council, 600 Washington Ave., Raymond, WA 98577 and the City of Long Beach, P.O. Box 310, Long Beach, WA 98631.
- 6. <u>Nondiscrimination.</u> The EDC certifies that it is an equal opportunity employer and that it does not discriminate in its hiring or employment practices or in the provision of any of its services on the basis of membership in any group protected by state of federal law.
- 7. <u>Liability.</u> The EDC shall hold the City and its officers, agents and employees acting in their official capacity or course of employment, harmless from all suits, claims or liabilities of any nature, for and on account of injuries or damages sustained by any person or property resulting in whole or part from activities or omissions of the EDC, its agents or employees pursuant to this agreement.
- 8. <u>Subcontracting.</u> The contract is personal to each of the parties thereto and neither party may assign or delegate any of its rights or obligations hereunder except as set forth in this contract.
- 9. <u>Integrated Document.</u> This contract embodies the contract, terms and conditions between the City and the Pacific County EDC. No verbal agreements or conversations any representatives of either party shall modify or affect the terms and obligations of this contract.




