SUMMARY STATEMENT: Discussion on unused portion of Rights of Way (ROW). This issue has been ongoing for more than 30 years. City staff in the past allowed the property owner to could landscape the unused portion of the ROW, but couldn't preclude cars from parking in the area and also had the understanding that if for some reason the city had to dig up the landscaping for installation or maintenance purposes, we wouldn't cover any costs to replace or repair damage to the landscaping.

Potential Concerns with ROW uses:

1. Liability issues may arise depending on use.
2. The city may need that land in the near future for travel or utility purposes. Future owners may not be aware ROW is not their property.
3. If adjacent owners don't maintain, the city will potential spend more time mowing and maintaining.

Suggested recommendations:

1. Keep the status quo and allow property owners to continue to landscape unused ROW. Minimum distance from pavement edge to landscaping should not be less than 10 feet. Future disturbance of landscaping will not be repaired or reimbursed. Fencing is not considered landscaping.
2. Reserve ROW for future utility and travel uses. Property owner may not landscape past property lines.

While almost every meeting when most of the city council is present is considered a public meeting, that doesn't necessitate the Council allowing public comment. If the Mayor and Council request more information or clarification, they may seek input from the audience.

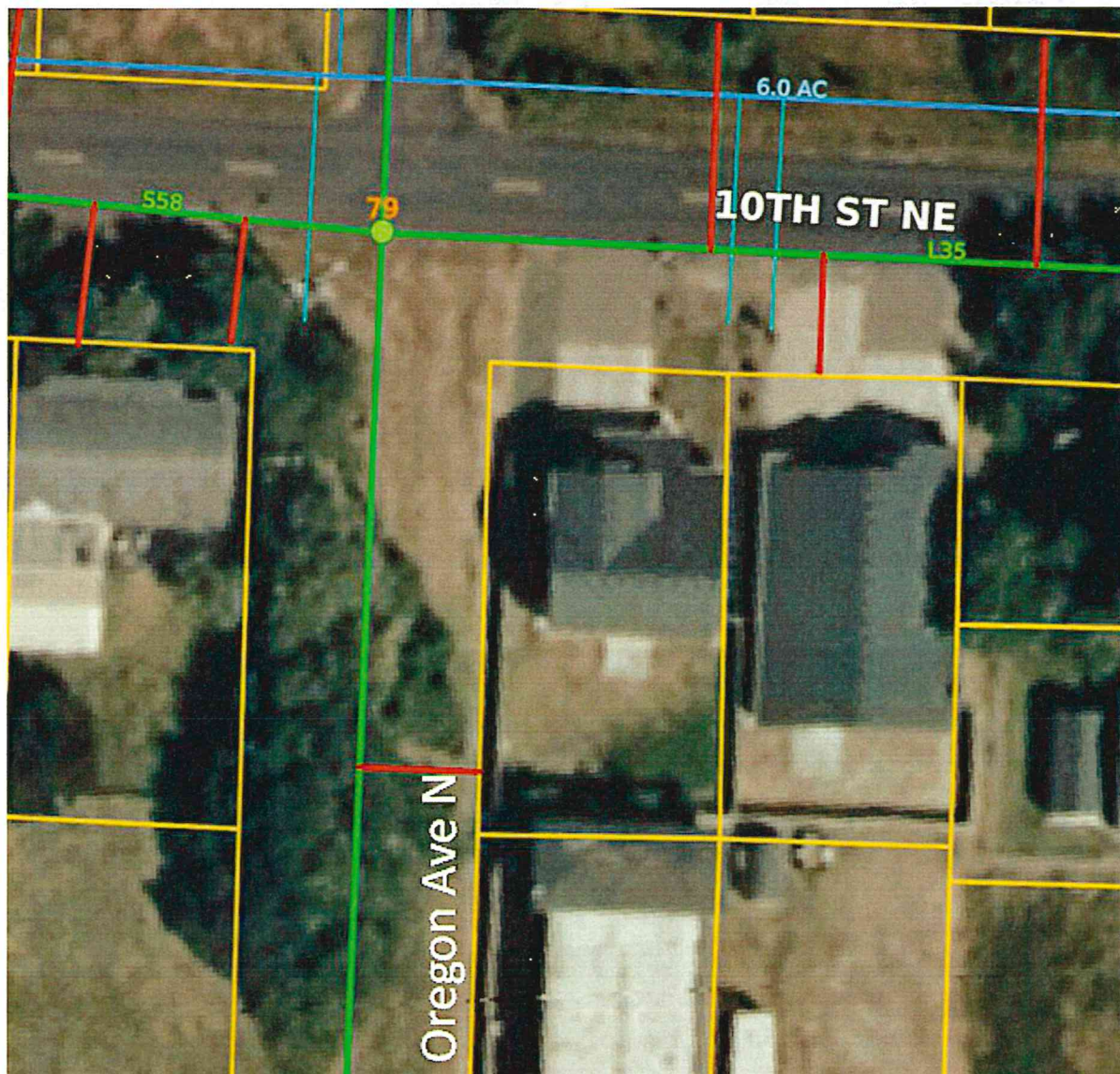

AB 19-42– Lodging Tax Request- Reusable Bags

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. Martha Williams and other community members have advocated for the reusable bag campaign. Last June the Council agreed to fund 3000 bags which was equivalent to \$4,318.59. The Council has discussed this topic multiple times during workshops and staff updates.

C. McGuire made the motion to approve funding the reusable bag campaign for another 1500 bags to be purchased with lodging tax dollars. C. Linhart seconded the motion; 4 Ayes, motion passed.

AB 19-43– 2018 Budget Amendment

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. The Ordinance presented amends the 2018 budget to include additional, unexpected expenditures in the Current Expense, Convention Center, Water and Stormwater Funds.

C. Linhart made the motion to approve Ordinance 969 amending the 2018 budget. C. Kline seconded the motion; 4 Ayes, motion passed.

AB 19-44– AWC Voting Delegates

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. The city is sending 2 elected officials and the City Administrator to the Annual AWC Conference this June. AWC needs to know whom would like to be voting delegates.

C. Linhart made the motion to authorize the city administrator to notify AWC that our Mayor, Councilmember McGuire, and the City Administrator are the voting delegates for Long Beach. C. Kline seconded the motion; 4 Ayes, motion passed.

AB 19-45– On-Call Engineering Services

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. The city put out an RFQ for on-call engineering services and one SOQ was submitted. Gray and Osborne is the only firm that submitted and our current City Engineers.

C. Linhart made the motion to authorize the Mayor to enter into an agreement with Gray and Osborne for on-call engineering services. C. McGuire seconded the motion; 4 Ayes, motion passed.

AB 19-46– Asbestos Abatement of 1315 Pacific Ave South

David Glasson, City Administrator, presented the Agenda Bill. The bid for asbestos abatement at 1315 Pacific Ave South closed on Friday, June 7th. There was only one bidder who is registered on our Small Works Roster. This building has gone through various stages of the code enforcement process and is now at the point where the city is ready to intervene and demolish.

WHEREAS, capital facilities plans aid cities in developing the needed financing for capital expenditures and the construction of public facilities, and in the application for grants and loans from state and federal programs; and

WHEREAS, it is the intention of the City Council to revise the Six-Year Capital Facilities Plan on an annual basis and ensure it agrees with other related plans; and

WHEREAS, the City Council did hold a public hearing on the review of the 2020–2025 Capital Facilities Plan on the 1st day of July 2019; and

WHEREAS, all comments to the 2020–2025 Capital Facilities Plan for capital expenditures and construction of public facilities within its jurisdictional boundaries were considered.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH, WASHINGTON, DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

The City Council of the City of Long Beach, Washington, approves and adopts the revised and extended Six-Year Capital Facilities Plan for the ensuing six calendar years for the period 2020 through 2025 referenced as Exhibit A and to be updated annually.

Effective Date. This resolution, being an exercise of power specifically delegated to the city legislative body, is not subject to referendum and shall take effect five (5) days after passage by the City Council.

ORDINANCE No. 970

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH, WASHINGTON AMENDING THE FEE STRUCTURE FOR SAND HAULING PERMITS AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, there is a need to haul sand for construction and land development purposes, and

WHEREAS, the City of Long Beach has allowed for the removal of beach sand to use for clean fill material and to maintain the beach approaches, and

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH, WASHINGTON AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Fee Schedule.

The following fees are hereby established for removing and hauling sand in Long Beach. These fees will be placed into the street fund.

Two-day permit, unlimited amount for \$75.00

Section 2. Repealing conflicting ordinances.

Ordinance Number 967 is hereby repealed.

Section 3. Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days from and after its passage approval and publication in the manner required by law.


